Debuting at the Soldiers' Angels Leadership meetings in Pasadena, a museum documenting the history and activities of Soldiers' Angels received rave reviews from attending Angels, military personnel, and members of supportive companies. Soldiers' Angels has since been flooded with requests to have it erected in towns around the country to help educate people about the need and opportunities for Americans to "support the troops" in both word and deed.

Packed with historical treasures, the museum is a testament to the life of soldiers in wartime, and the efforts of the home front to meet their needs. Detailed displays documenting the Soldiers' Angels story include letters from the front, national and unit-based awards and commendations, photographs, media coverage of SA activities, artifacts from various SA projects, and sentimental thank you gifts from "adopted" soldiers. There is also an alcove with a tribute to adopted SA troops who have fallen in the line of duty, large photographs of military life at home and in the field, and pictures and thank you notes from military families.

Visitors report having a powerful response to viewing the museum--mourning the fallen, contemplating page after page of letters of gratitude, recognizing the impact the home front has on the battlefield, and being inspired by the story of how one person can start a movement that changes the lives of hundreds of thousands of soldiers and everyday citizens.

An Award that Recognizes a "Spirit of Service" is Bestowed Upon the Founder of Soldiers' Angels



Every summer, thousands of VFW delegates to the national convention converge in a major U.S. city to elect national officers and vote on new governing amendments and organizational bylaws. During this time, recognition will be given to a special woman that has spread her wings in supporting the deployed and wounded service members, their families and veterans. For founding Soldiers' Angels and other exemplary work that she does to make the world a better place, Patti Patton Bader has just been notified that she is the recipient of the **VFW 2008 James E. Van Zandt Citizenship Award** that will be presented to her at the VFW 109th National Convention in Orlando, Florida on August 20, 2008.

"The VFW Citizenship Award - Awarded for outstanding service contributing to American citizenship. To recognize significant contribution to the spirit of service and dedication to the nation that inspires us to display better citizenship."

"James E. "Jimmy" Van Zandt was Commander-in-Chief of the VFW three times, and a veteran of three wars (World War I, World War II, and the Korean War). He served as an enlisted man in World War I and retired as an admiral following the Korean War. Descended from a pioneer family in Blair County, Pennsylvania, Jimmy worked his way from newsboy to United States Congressman. Recipients of the award named in Van Zandt's honor exemplify his dedication to public service, citizenship, and other admirable qualities."

Other citizens that have had this honor bestowed upon them during the 50 years it's been given out include Ronald Reagan, Lyndon Johnson, Gerald Ford, Hubert Humphrey, John Connally, Sam Rayburn, Jeannie Kirkpatrick, William Bennett, and Barbara Bush.

The Veterans of Foreign Wars of the United States, with its Auxiliaries, includes 2.3 million members in approximately 8,400 Posts worldwide. Its mission is to "honor the dead by helping the living" through veterans' service, community service, national security and a strong national defense.

The VFW traces its roots back to 1899 when veterans of the Spanish-American War (1898) and the Philippine Insurrection (1899-1902) founded local organizations to secure rights and benefits for their service: Many arrived home wounded or sick. There was no medical care or veterans' pension for them, and they were left to care for themselves.

The Sewing Team is made of several groups:

- Blankets of Hope: Angels sewing blankets for the wounded. These blankets have brought hope to many of our wounded heroes.
- Scarves Team: Sewing cool scarves and sand scarves.
- Mittens and Booties: Hand and foot coverings made for wounded soldiers on Medevac flights back to the US, and simple fleece coverings used to help keep critical patients' extremities warm.
- Crochet Team: Hand crochet or knitted lap blankets for veterans is the specialty of this team.

The Sewing Team is happy to report that we now have around 3,000 members! Every day, around the country and around the world, “sewers” (from pre-schoolers to seniors or individuals and groups) are making quilts, fleece blankets, lap afghans, sand scarves, cooling scarves, knit caps, tracheotomy bibs, slippers, wheelchair bags, and more. These items, made with loving care, are shipped and hand delivered to our heroes: the deployed, the wounded, veterans, and military families, including babies.

Other ways to find out more about the Sewing Team is to contact any of our leaders. If anyone would like to become a “sewer,” but you don’t actually sew, blanket kits for non-sewers are available in the Soldiers’ Angels Store.

Thank you to everyone who is already a member of our team and to those of you who aren’t, we hope you will join us!

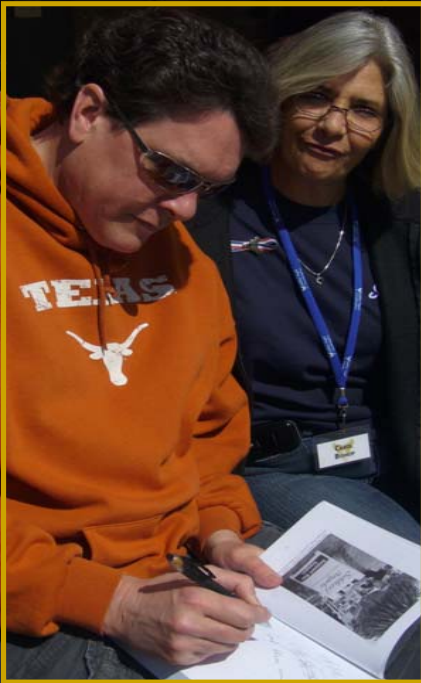

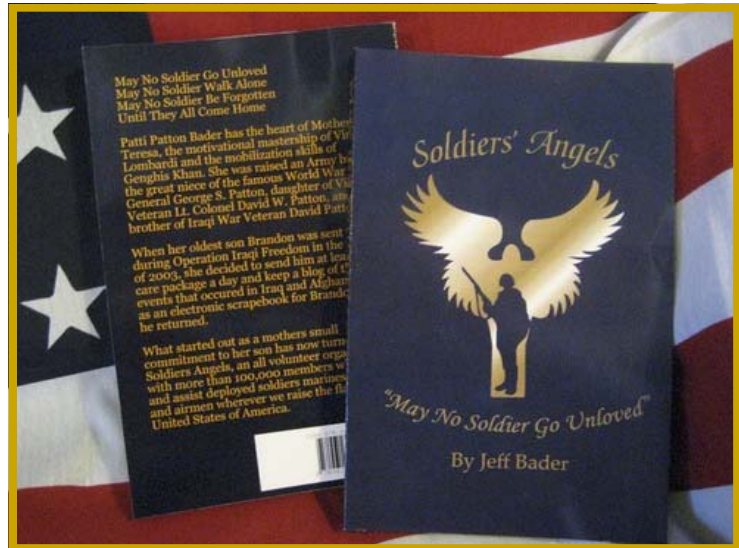

The Soldier Support teams are focused on responding to the needs of deployed heroes.

- **The Angel Baker Team** has seen a “changing of the guard” with founder Sara Erlich moving into more administrative responsibility. Catherine Dalton has graciously accepted and is energetically pursuing the Angel Bakers reaching new heights in 2008. From a few bakers sending goodies to a small unit a few years ago, it’s estimated over 1000 boxes of goodies were shipped in 2007.
- **Karen Gill heads up the Chaplain Support Team** supporting special members of the armed services who are depended on in times good and bad. Along with the “regular” support that includes literally dozens of care packages each week for the Chaplains to pass out, the past month was like “Christmas in March” with the distribution of literally thousands of Bibles on DVD.
- **The Letter Writing Team** headed by Linda Spurlin Dominik has some incredible statistics. While it’s hard to believe that 2006’s figure of over ONE HUNDRED SIXTY THOUSAND letters would be topped, the 2007 report documents over TWO HUNDRED THOUSAND letters sent to deployed heroes. This is a very conservative estimate as it assumes only one letter when in reality many times the Angel will continue to correspond with their LWT Soldier.
- **Carol Bishop and Eileen Ragen head up the TLC Team**, responding to critical needs from a fire in the camp to a unit that suffered casualties to a group that can’t face one more MRE. Recently her team mobilized to get special support for a unit cut off of one of their supply lines due to some local political conditions.
- **Hero Flight Team is headed up by Kassie Claughton.** This team has provided 147 flights in March alone! Unfortunately the number of wounded and fallen increased this month requiring us to step up even more, we are reaching out for donations everywhere now to help.
- **Kassie also heads up the K9 Support Team** providing assistance to our four legged heroes and their handlers. Word from the sandbox is that Soldiers' Angels K-9 team is the only group that is specifically dedicated to our often forgotten Heroes! We are in the process of helping two different bases build kennels overseas for our dogs, so that deployment is a bit easier on them too.

If you want to make a difference in the lives of one of our deployed heroes, there is a team that would love to have you share your talents. It can be a one time thing, responding to a specific TLC request or you can take on continued involvement through the Letter Writing Team.

The 435th Contingency Aeromedical Staging Facility (CASF) at Ramstein Air Force Base in Germany recently received its 50,000th patient since 2003.

Contrary to popular belief, not all medevacs out of theater are Wounded in Action. WIAs have accounted for approximately 11,000 or 22% of the patients. A roughly equal number are classified as non-battle injuries. NBIs can result from vehicle rollovers or work with dangerous equipment. The remainder are called "Disease/other" by the DoD. Service members downrange are subject to the same ailments they might have suffered back home.

Although violence is down throughout Iraq, the number of total medevacs has remained fairly stable due to the high number of deployed service members. Statistics show that the number of inbound patients from Iraq (not including Afghanistan) has gone down from a peak of 771 in June 2007, to 564 in February this year.

Unfortunately we've seen an uptick in medevacs to Germany in March which has considerably reduced our supply reserves.

WIA is the abbreviation standing for Wounded In Action.

Military Order of the Purple Heart of the USA

The **Purple Heart** is an American decoration-the oldest military decoration in the world in present use and the first American award made available to the common soldier. It was initially created as the Badge of Military Merit by one of the world's most famed and best-loved heroes-General George Washington. General Washington is often pictured as a cold, stern soldier, a proud aristocrat. Yet we know he showed sympathy and concern for his troops, and was not too proud to pray humbly on his knees for his beloved country and for the men who served it, and him, so bravely and loyally. His keen appreciation of the importance of the common soldier in any campaign impelled him to recognize outstanding valor and merit by granting a commission or an advance in rank to deserving individuals. In the summer of 1782 he was ordered by the Continental Congress to cease doing so-there were no funds to pay the soldiers, much less the officers!

Deprived of his usual means of reward, he must have searched for a substitute. Shortly after receiving the "stop" order from Congress, he wrote his memorable General Orders of August 7, 1782, which read in part as follows:

"The General, ever desirous to cherish virtuous ambition in his soldiers as well as foster and encourage every species of military merit, directs that whenever any singularly meritorious action is performed, the author of it shall be permitted to wear on his facings, over his left breast, the figure of a heart in purple cloth or silk edged with narrow lace or binding. Not only instances of unusual gallantry but also of extraordinary fidelity and essential service in any way shall meet with due reward. The name and regiment of the persons so certified are to be enrolled in a Book of Merit which shall be kept in the orderly room." The order further states: "Men who have merited this distinction to be suffered to pass all guards and sentinels which officers are permitted to do. The order to be retroactive to the earliest stages of the war, and to be a permanent one." Washington ended his order with: "The road to glory in a patriot army and a free country is thus open to all."

Lost or misfiled for almost 150 years among the War Department Records at Washington, D.C., this important paper came to light during the search for Washington's papers prior to the celebration of his bicentennial in 1932. With it were the dramatic accounts of three soldiers who received the decoration at Newburgh, N.Y., at Washington's Headquarters. The Book of Merit has not been found. The U.S. War Department revived the Purple Heart decoration on February 22, 1932.

The **PURPLE HEART** is awarded to members of the armed forces of the U.S. who are wounded by an instrument of war in the hands of the enemy and posthumously to the next of kin in the name of those who are killed in action or die of wounds received in action. It is specifically a combat decoration.

- **E-voice Team - Mike Smith:** msmith1@cableone.net

The E-voice team is made up 6 people: Mike Smith, Kassie Claughton, Ramona Leff, Caron Rogers, Denise Ramsey, and Betsy Rhodes. This team's responsibilities include picking up all the messages on the Soldiers' Angels main phone line. They return each call, handling the caller's inquiry or determining who the message should be forwarded to for handling. They average close to 250 calls a month with each team member responsible for a day of the week. They are not out "on the Soldiers' Angels Front Lines," but they are often the first impression people get of Soldiers' Angels

- **Operation Outreach/SOS: Kids - Pam Kazlauskas:** pckaz@sbcglobal.net

The purpose of Operation SOS: KIDS is to send humanitarian relief through shipments to American soldiers for distribution to children in Iraq and Afghanistan, and other areas where our Heroes are deployed. U.S. Soldiers often give up their own goodies and snacks to be able to share with the children they see every day.

- **Operation Top Knot - Audri Cid:** operationtopknot@gmail.com

Operation Top Knot sends gifts to military families expecting a baby. They send blankets, booties, hats, clothing, diapers, bottles, and anything else a family would need for a new baby. They answer the call of families expecting their first child or their fifth, families with children experiencing hard times, and children of wounded soldiers. There are roughly 400 people on the mailing list for our team. From our inception 5 years ago we have showered hundreds of families, and we plan to continue this tradition for years to come.

- **Verification & Recommendation Team (VAR) - Ramona Leff:** soldiersangelsvarteam@gmail.com

The VAR Team is the Verification and Recommendation Team. Ramona Leff is the team leader, with Carol Irvine answering the phone calls for help. This team helps any our military and their families in special situations. The VAR team verifies paperwork, does research on the families, creates a funding form and submits it to our Soldiers' Angels office for recommendation to help the military family or not.

Since Soldiers' Angels founding and through the ongoing growth and creation of SA teams and special projects, we have reached out to thousands of Soldiers and their families. Whereas, More than 40 percent of these soldiers, sailors, airmen, and Marines have left families with children behind; and,

Whereas, More than one million of America's children have at least one parent currently serving active military duty; and,

Whereas, These children are a source of pride and honor to us all, and it is only fitting that we take time to recognize their contributions, celebrate their spirit, and let our men and women in uniform know that while they're taking care of us, we're taking care of their children; and,

Whereas, The recognition of the "Month of the Military Child" will allow us to pay tribute to military children for their commitment, their struggles and their unconditional support of our troops, because when parents serve in the military, their ***Kids Serve Too***; and,

Whereas, A month-long salute to military children will encourage support for "***Kids Serve Too***" and other organizations and campaigns established to provide direct support to military children and families; and now therefore be it,

Resolved, That I, Patti Patton - Bader, founder of Soldiers' Angels, do hereby proclaim April 2008, as The Month of the Military Child within the Soldiers' Angels organization.

I encourage all Angels to observe the month with appropriate ceremonies and activities that honor, support and thank military children.

Maupin had been listed as missing-captured since April 16, 2004. His convoy came under attack by individuals using rocket-propelled grenades and small arms fire on April 9, 2004. He was assigned to the 724th Transportation Company, Bartonville, Ill.
